The Thanksgiving service for life of Dr John and Doreen Sharp was held in Kisiizi on 31<sup>st</sup> July 2022.


We were delighted to listen to Dr. Twongyeirwe Julius testify of how the ministry in Kisiizi has transformed his entire life.


Bishop Patrick Tugume also shared a recorded message.


We thank Dr Andrew Sharp who sent a very warm message on behalf of the Sharp family, full of historical events.

This will give a big grant to help strengthen the community health insurance scheme in Kisiizi and to replicate it in 14 other hospitals around Uganda to provide quality access to healthcare to 150,000 more beneficiaries in the next 2 years and hopefully many more beyond!

#### The Rains are back, Praise the Lord!

Though Kisiizi does not struggle to keep an ever-green cover, the dry season comes with many challenges including our hydro-electric generator struggling to run due to low water levels, causing power outages. We were excited to receive the rainy season that would also coincide with the planting season for our communities.



We are also aware of the challenges that usually come with the rainy season like flooding, and interference with the hospital activities.

A number of strategies have been put in place to prevent these from happening.

The blue arrows in the picture below show the roofed walkways leading to some of the wards from the out-patient department. More work still needs to be done to connect all ward areas as funds allow..





We thank All-Souls Church, London for contributing towards the construction of the retaining wall of the water channel behind the old flax factory building that houses the Surgery and Gynecology wards plus the chapel.

This will help protect both the power house and the old flax building from floods and it will improve the resilience of power generation.



#### **Laparoscopic Camp**

A surgical camp was held for 4 days and 10 patients were operated on and recovered very quickly and very well. The team donated various equipment and sundries and equipped us with new knowledge and skills.

Ever since the camp, the team of doctors at Kisiizi hospital has continued routinely to perform surgeries laparoscopically and at a very subsidized cost, being the furthest hospital south of Kampala with the service

#### **Ophthalmology services**

We thank the Lions International Clubs Foundation through their Mbarara league, in collaboration with Mbarara University Department of Ophthalmology, for launching the comprehensive eye care project at Kisiizi Hospital in July this year. Following training of two of our staff members in eye care, an eye surgical camp was held at the hospital during which 34 patients underwent eye surgery with very good outcomes, thanks to Dr Sam (the one waving) and the entire team.









We continue to cherish the longstanding partnership we have with Ruharo eye Hospital through Dr Keith Waldeyer.

#### CHEERS - we have missed you!

It was so refreshing and life-giving to have the CHEERS Team visit and support our community. CV19 had stopped recent previous attempt to visit so it was such a pleasure to have them again. Group leader, Stacy Ann Nevin writes:

The 2022 CHEERS:DHT multidisciplinary team included Physiotherapists (Bernie and Hannah), Speech and Language Therapists (Aileen and Emma), Pharmacists/Team Leads (Stacy and Sharon), as well as an Occupational Therapist (Edel), a nurse (Niamh) and a Dietitian (Eimear). The team arrived in Kisiizi late on Saturday, July 2, and the following day enjoyed a visit to the beautiful Kisiizi Falls and meeting some of the locals. Every day the team enjoyed the welcome with song and drumbeats in the Kisiizi Hospital Chapel. During our first day at the Kisiizi hospital site, the team met various key stakeholders of the hospital, who made us feel welcome and answered our questions, including Ainebyona Dan (physiotherapist), the rehab team and various discipline-specific leaders that we met during a first tour of the hospital facilities.



The successful delivery of the 2day 'Care of the Older Person' workshop was one of the key objectives of the CHEEERS: DHT team. The workshops were held on July 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> in the Kisiizi Falls Visitor Centre and were attended by over 75 healthcare professionals on both days, including Kisiizi hospital staff and professionals who traveled from other parts of Uganda including Kampala, Ntungamo, Kabale and beyond. In addition to delivering engaging workshop presentations, each

volunteer worked alongside hospital staff with projects related to their discipline, and though there are too many to describe in full, here are some examples: the Speech and Language Therapists provided multiple training opportunities to nurses on how to perform swallow assessments; the Occupational Therapist worked with Ahumuza (Psychiatry service) to provide meaningful activities for the patients there; the Nurse pioneered the first sexual health education training in a local school with Rehab staff member Monica, and a cohort of this year's team also joined a Community Outreach visit.

Finally, the team fundraised hard to raise the required funds to support a digital X-Ray machine at Kisiizi Hospital We are  $now \in 2,500$  short of the target of  $\in 15,000$  and we would be grateful for any support or assistance to enable us to realize this essential diagnostic piece of equipment for Kisiizi. 
Mr Alex Scott- a medical student from UK, recently came for placement with his wife, and shared his experience as

#### **Ahumuza Update**

It is wonderful to have ongoing support from individuals who have visited Kisiizi, and it was a privilege to welcome Jane and Graham Pettinger who visited for a few weeks in July and August. They have written about their time with Ahumuza:



"Following our three month visit to KH in October 2019, we were delighted to be able to follow this up in July 2022, a visit which would have happened much sooner but for the pandemic.

It was wonderful to renew our many friendships in Kisiizi, but we were especially excited to see the lovely Ahumuza team with whom we have shared lively WhatsApp contact over the months. Psychiatric clinical officer Orishaba Georgious has developed the team effectively since we left in January 2020 and we were impressed that they all set off for a team building away day on our first Saturday. Photos emerged of them rafting, canoeing, and eating fish they had caught!"



There have been several new appointments to the psychiatric nursing team: Ivan, Violet and Shereen. These new members have each added great value to what had already become a very cohesive and effective team. We are impressed with all of their commitment, compassion and clinical skills. We enjoyed sharing some tutorials with them, and the wider team.

Great progress has been made in the area of developing the ward environment. Many patients spend several weeks or months on the ward with their attendants, and now they all benefit from a small but healthy plantation behind the ward where they help grow matoke and mangoes... They are also now breeding rabbits, which many of the patients enjoy tending. A newly built piggery is now in place, and ready to house pigs as soon as swine flu is no longer a threat. All of this is good occupational and emotional therapy, and also helps to feed those destitute patients without attendants – sadly not uncommon on Ahumuza ward.





Our visit coincided with a community leaders' education day organised by Georgious with the aim of raising awareness about mental health needs and promoting community action to improve the response to a mental illness within a family. About thirty community leaders gathered and responded very positively to the messages being presented by Georgious and sister Prima, engaging with the issues and sharing their thoughts and ideas. This is vital work in these poor rural communities, where patients with mental illness can still be badly stigmatised and may live in the most desperate circumstances.

Before we left, we held a team party which featured Bakiga dancing, and a very, very large pan of matoke grown in the ward plantation! We feel privileged to be involved in a small way with the mental health team at Kisiizi hospital. They are a focused and dedicated unit, with a strong positive approach to the many challenges they face, and above all, huge compassion for their patients.
